Nancy Kellogg completed her MD, pediatrics residency, and pediatrics internship at the University of Texas Health Sciences Center, San Antonio, where she is now a tenured professor of pediatrics. She is the medical director of the Alamo Children's Advocacy Center and a consultant and trainer for the Texas Department of Protective and Regulatory Services and the San Antonio Police Department. Dr. Kellogg is also part of the medical staff at Christus Santa Rosa Medical Center and University Hospital. Dr. Kellogg is a 2003 recipient of the Presidential Award for Clinical Excellence from the University of Texas Health Science Center, a 2000 nominee for the governor's office "Texas Woman of the Year" in Health Services, and, since 1999, a member of the honorary Ray Helfer Society. Approximately 200 physicians and nurses have received intensive child abuse training under her direction, and she has developed a formal weeklong curriculum through the current Children's Justice Act Grant to Texas. She is also a prolific writer (graduated magna cum laude from Dartmouth College with a BA in English) and developer of sexual abuse multimedia training materials. Dr. Kellogg has authored over 70 publications.

As a former child protective service social worker, Julie Kenniston trains national and internationally in the area of child forensic interviewing. Nancy was elected to the Board of Directors of the American Professional Society on the Abuse of Children (APSAC) in 1996, and was re-elected to a second 3-year term in 1999. She served on APSAC's Executive Committee from 1997-2002, and also chaired the Professional Education committee during her tenure on the Executive Committee. In 2003, she was awarded APSAC's Outstanding Service Award, given annually to an APSAC member in recognition of outstanding service to the organization. Nancy is past president of the North Carolina Professional Society on the Abuse of Children (NCPSAC), and served on the Board of Directors from 1993 to 2004. In 1999, she was the recipient of NCPSAC's Kimberly Crews award, given annually to an NCPSAC member in recognition of professional

He has traveled both in the US and abroad presenting to judges, attorneys, law enforcement, social workers, medical and mental health professionals regarding issues related to child abuse. Professor Myers is the author of eight books and more than one hundred articles on child abuse. More than 150 courts, including the United States Supreme Court and the California State Supreme Court, have cited his writings. Prior to his move to McGeorge Law School, Professor Myers practiced law in Utah.

Nestell, Heidi

Heidi Nestel is currently the Project Director and staff attorney for the Utah Crime Victims Legal Clinic—providing free legal representation to victims of crimes as they go through the criminal justice system. Heidi served as a prosecutor for the Davis County Attorney's Office as well as the Victim Service Director for that Office. In her eight years working for Davis County, she specialized in prosecuting violent crimes against women including domestic violence assault, violation of protective orders, and rape and sexual assaults. Heidi also prosecuted in the juvenile court system and found making a difference for both victims of juvenile crime and the delinquents, themselves, very rewarding. Rick serves as the co-chair of the recently formed Sex Abuse Services Network of Utah (SASNU), a network focusing on improving the services provided to sex abuse victims throughout Utah, as well as serving as a co-chair of the Utah NOJOS (Network on Juveniles Offending Sexually) organization. Rick has presented at several NOJOS trainings regarding sex abuse treatment issues. Rick is also a certified suicide prevention training specialist. For over fifteen years Robin prosecuted some of the most despicable defendants who committed the most heinous crimes. As one of the prosecuting attorneys for the Child Sexual Assault division of the Los Angeles County Sex Crimes Unit, Robin worked with a multi-disciplinary team at UCLA's Rape Treatment Center/The Stuart House. While working with law enforcement, victims' advocates, social workers, and members of the Los Angeles Department of Children and Family Services, she investigated and prosecuted hundreds of child sexual assault cases. Robin has written six books that draw upon her vast experience as a sex-crimes prosecutor, legal commentator, child advocate and parenting expert. For over a decade, Robin has been an in-demand public speaker on the topics of child sexual assault, family violence, domestic abuse, stalking, Internet safety, and the criminal justice system.

She developed a three-day forensic interview training program in which more than 1,000 child abuse investigators have been trained. Ms. Toth began her career in 1980 as a Washington State Prosecutor where she prosecuted child abuse and sexual assault cases. For 7 years, she was the 1st Director of APRI's National Center for the Prosecution of Child Abuse and then later worked as a federal prosecutor in the Child Exploitation Section of the US Department of Justice. Ms. Toth currently provides forensic interview training to law enforcement, child protective serve workers and other professions who deal with child sexual abuse. She developed Washington State's CPOD Guidelines for First Responders to Child Fatalities and Serious Physical Injury and was the 2008 recipient of the J. Pat Finley Child Protection Lifetime Achievement Award.

Brian L. Thorn, Ph.D., is a licensed psychologist whose background includes working with a wide range of populations and ages.
